#### Letter from the Director

The Louisiana Department of Agriculture & Forestry-Medical Marijuana Program is pleased to submit its 1<sup>st</sup> annual comprehensive report to the Legislature in accordance with LRS 40:1046 (H)(6) and LRS 40:1047.

In 2015, Act 261, R.S.40:1046 was enacted by the legislature and the Medical Marijuana Program was established. The legislature divided the responsibility for implementing the medical marijuana program between three state agencies: Louisiana Board of Medical Examiners, Louisiana Board of Pharmacy, and Louisiana Department of Agriculture and Forestry. In 2016, the statute was amended and supplemented by Act 96, which clarifies prescribing vs. recommending medical marijuana to patients and added qualifying medical conditions. R.S. 40:1047 was also established in 2016. In 2018, the qualifying medical conditions were expanded by Act 708 and Act 496.

The Department of Agriculture and Forestry is responsible for developing rules and regulations including but not limited to the areas of extraction, processing, production of recommended therapeutic marijuana, and the facility producing the medical marijuana. The rules and regulations created by the department covers the procedures for licensing and permitting, qualifications and eligibility, background checks and standards for suitability determination, fees and penalties for violations, compliance and inspections, and reporting and record keeping, etc. The Department is also responsible with developing an annual, nontransferable license for the production of therapeutic use.

Louisiana Revised Statute 40:1046 named two agricultural centers Louisiana State University Agricultural Center and Southern University Agricultural Center to have the right of first refusal to be licensed as production facilities separately or jointly for the therapeutic marijuana program in Louisiana. In June 2016, Louisiana State University Agricultural Center issued a written notice to the Commissioner of Agriculture & Forestry of their intent to be licensed as a production facility. In August 2016, Southern University Agricultural Center released a written statement to the department confirming their intent to be licensed as a production facility.

The two agricultural universities, Louisiana State University and Southern University, opted to subcontract services for the production of medical marijuana as the only legal growers in the state of Louisiana. Louisiana State University AgCenter selected GB Sciences of Louisiana, LLC. Southern University AgCenter selected Advanced Biomedics, LLC d/b/a Ilera Hollistic Healthcare. The licensees, LSU AgCenter and SU AgCenter, have submitted annual reports to the department listing their production costs and pertinent information related to the requirements set forth in LRS 40:1046 (H)(6) for the year of 2018. With the continuation of budget shortfalls and constricted budgets in our state, the Louisiana Medical Marijuana Program has been operating with no additional state funding since established in 2015. The department has proceeded into the fiscal year of 2018-2019 with the operating budget of \$1,374,933 with hopes our state will address the underlying issues and provide funding. Currently, the Medical Marijuana Program has borrowed \$603,643.00 from Agricultural Environmental Sciences Division within the department to purchase laboratory equipment for medical marijuana testing required by law. The department has outlined expenditures for the fiscal year of 2018-2019. Please refer to Exhibit C for the department's breakdown.

# Louisiana Department of Agriculture and Forestry

The Louisiana Department of Agriculture and Forestry was created in accordance with the provisions of Article IV, Section 10 of the Constitution of Louisiana. The Commissioner of Agriculture and Forestry heads the department and exercises all functions of the state relating to the promotion, protection, and advancement of agriculture and forestry, except research and educational functions expressly allocated by the constitution or by law to other state agencies.

- The mission of the Office of Agricultural and Environmental Sciences is to ensure animal feeds, pet foods, fertilizers, agricultural liming materials and pesticides meet all requirements of law; to monitor, prevent, control and eradicate plant pests and diseases that threaten Louisiana's agriculture, environment and economy; to facilitate agricultural exports through certification of products; to oversee the qualifications and practices of persons engaged in the green industry; to protect human health and the environment by ensuring the proper labeling, distribution, storage, use, application and disposal of pesticides, and through enforcement of all pesticide laws; to ensure that seed sold for planting meets label guarantees and quality standards; and to ensure a safe, abundant supply of food and fiber.
- The mission of the Office of Agro-Consumer Services is to perform functions relating to the regulation of weights and measures, the licensing of weighmasters, scale companies and technicians; the licensing and inspection of bonded farm warehouses and milk processing plants, and the licensing of grain dealers, warehouses and cotton buyers.
- The mission of the Office of Animal Health Services is to protect the public supply of meat and meat products and fish and fish products, to control and eradicate infectious diseases of animals and poultry, and to control livestock theft and nuisance animals.
- The mission of the Office of Forestry is to protect, conserve and replenish the forest natural resources of the state.
- The mission of the Office of Marketing and Agro-Economic Development is to promote the development and growth of markets for Louisiana agricultural and forestry products and to develop the channels of distribution through which these products are sold.
- The mission of the Office of Soil and Water is to assist in the organization and administration of the Soil and Water Conservation Districts in protecting the land, water and related resources of the state. It is also responsible for implementing the agriculture nonpoint source pollution component of Section 319 and Section 404 (wetlands protection) of the Federal Clean Water Act, as well as other federal and state mandated soil and water resources management programs.
- The mission of the Office of Management and Finance is to provide support services for the other offices of the department. These services provided include: fiscal, legal, procurement, property control, human resources, fleet and facility management, auditing, information technology, print shop and mail room, document imaging and district office clerical support.

# About the Medical Marijuana Program

The Louisiana Medical Marijuana Program is under the Office of the Commissioner. It was created by ACT 261 of the 2015 Regular Session. This act authorized the Department of Agriculture and Forestry to develop rules and regulations regarding the extraction, processing, and production of recommended therapeutic marijuana and the facility producing therapeutic marijuana. The department's mission is to ensure that the patients with debilitating medical conditions are receiving a safe product. The debilitating medical conditions as defined in LRS 40:1046 are cancer, positive status for human immunodeficiency virus, acquired immune deficiency syndrome, cachexia or wasting syndrome, seizure disorders, epilepsy, spasticity, Crohn's disease, muscular dystrophy, or multiple sclerosis.

# **Program Goals**

The goals of the program are: 1) to assure through inspection, random sampling and lab testing, that the product is safe from heavy metals, pesticides, microbiological contaminants and residual solvents; 2) to oversee the practices of the licensees; 3) to ensure proper storage, labeling, distribution and disposal of the product.

# **About our LDAF State Laboratory**

The Agriculture Chemistry Division is responsible for administering state laws that regulate the manufacturing and sale of fertilizers and agricultural liming materials. The division performs chemical analyses in its agricultural chemistry laboratory in support of the administration and enforcement of these laws. The division is located at the Agricultural Chemistry Building on Louisiana State University's campus. The division provides analytical chemistry support for other LDAF programs: Pesticide and Environmental Programs within the Office of Agricultural and Environmental Sciences, the Feed Program and the Meat Inspection Program, both within the Office of Animal Health and Food Sciences including the most recent addition of Medical Marijuana Program within the Office of the Commissioner. As the official regulatory laboratory for the LDAF, the laboratory is a vital partner to the LDAF in carrying out its regulatory responsibilities.

  - Due to delays related to change in ownership, the contractor has not yet begun to grow marijuana and produce medicine. Production is expected to begin in March/April 2019.

  - Currently, the contractor has executed a lease agreement on the land that will be used for the facility. Costs associated with production are limited to labor (2 employees-\$7,784.83), advisory services (\$7,500.00), construction/building permits (\$4,000.00) and communications/public relations (\$10,000.00).
- The details of any items or services for which the licensee subcontracted and the cost of each subcontractor directly or indirectly working for the contractor.
  - Currently, no subcontracts have been initiated between Southern University and/or Advanced Biomedics d/b/a Ilera Holistic for any services directly or indirectly related to the project.
